On this beautiful morning, with a chill in the air, Happy Easter Holidays to each of you.

It was so good seeing many of you in Richmond recently. I truly pray for a good attendance for the upcoming VA State Convention when we are able to see and enjoy our sisters.

Prayers also continue for Dot Brown, former VSC State President, who had pacemaker installed after some "not so comfortable" days. Prayers continue for all our sisters and their families in our "ups and downs" faced daily.

A few interesting facts I've read about Easter -

EASTER, principal festival of the Christian church, which celebrates the Resurrection of Jesus Christ on the third day after his Crucifixion. The earliest recorded observation of an Easter celebration comes from the 2nd century though the commemoration of Jesus' Resurrection. In the 20th century several attempts were made to arrive at a fixed date for Easter, with the Sunday following the second Saturday in April specifically proposed.

I do not believe a formal date has ever been agreed upon. Easter, like Christmas, has accumulated a great many traditions, some of which have little to do with the Christian celebration of the Resurrection but derive from folk customs. The custom of the Easter Lamb appropriates both the appellation used for Jesus in the Scriptures and the lamb's role as a sacrificial animal in ancient Israel. The use of painted and decorated Easter eggs was first recorded in the 13th century. The church prohibited the eating of eggs during Holy Week

but chickens continued to lay eggs during that week, and the notion of specially identifying those as "Holy Week" eggs brought about their decoration.

The Easter Rabbit is said to lay eggs as well as decorate and hide them. In the US the Easter rabbit leaves children baskets with toys and candies on Easter morning.

Not a lot, but just a small explanation of Easter. You know I've always heard you must have a new Easter outfit or at least an Easter bonnet so I guess, until recently, I went along with that and got Easter outfits for myself as well as Gil & Ginger. I can remember one year when Ginger was still in grade school, she came home and asked me if it was o.k. to get new clothes for Easter - as I looked at her in amazement I prayed God help me with this one and replied "Yes honey its just fine to get new clothes for Easter as it represents a new beginning" Now that may not work for all of you, but it did for her and at that moment, it was just the answer I needed.

Mona is a 40-year ESA member and is from Wilburton, Oklahoma. Mona recently received a Career Enhancement Grant for EMDR training in rural Southeast Oklahoma. As a licensed Professional Counselor, Mona offers services to a variety of clients who have undergone trauma. Children who have suffered trauma, adolescents, adults, and recently the need has arisen to offer training to "First Responders "for trauma they have witnessed. Mona received a call from the Latimer County Sheriff and was asked if she would be willing to have therapy sessions with his First Responders who had 'worked' a teen suicide. Of course, the answer was yes, and she had the opportunity to help these First Responders who were First on the Scene. As they described their involvement, her mind went to the needs of others in her community that the EMDR training would benefit from due to the trauma these young men had undergone. Mona realized the need for this training did not only come from this need, but also for others who have been traumatized especially children who have been abused, mostly by parents, and have been placed in Guardianship Placement. EMDR stands for Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing. It is very common around the world and is based on how your brain stores and retrieves trauma memories. EMDR is used by the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Department of Defense as a 'best practice' in treating a



We are hoping that continued therapy will get her back to the point of being able to walk on her own and climb stairs. She has a follow-up appointment at UVA on March 7 with neuro so here's praying her MRI scan is picture perfect!

We supported several organizations/causes over the past several months including the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank, the Food Pantry, Alzheimer's Association, Apple Tree Project (purchasing Christmas gifts for children whose parent(s) are incarcerated), many local school booster clubs and sports organizations, St. Jude, the ESA Disaster Fund, and several veteran's groups.

One of the most rewarding projects we just completed was serving a meal to the homeless in the Staunton/Augusta County area last Saturday evening. Central United Methodist Church provided a warm space to house the homeless as part of the Warm Shelter project, where area churches provide space for a week or two and organizations provide dinner, breakfast, and lunch. Brenda and I did all the cooking for the dinner of roasted pork loins, gravy, mashed potatoes, green beans, rolls, and dessert and Brenda and Jim put together a light breakfast of muffins/fruit and lunch sandwiches, chips and dessert which are taken with them when they leave every morning by 7 a.m. We enlisted some help from friends and family and were blessed to have been able to bring some warmth, nutrition, and care within the community. We

served 45 - 50 people and it is humbling to be faced with the fact that there are so many people who have nowhere to sleep, especially in these cold winter months.

We had a lot of food left over (because you know that we always want to ensure there is more than enough) and took it to Station 1 Staunton Fire Department for the men and women who work overnight. So...two (2) blessings in one meal!

Looking forward to seeing a lot of you in Richmond next month. Brenda and I will be traveling down on Saturday morning and staying to celebrate with Beta Sigma. Until then ... may God bless you all with good health and tender mercies!
